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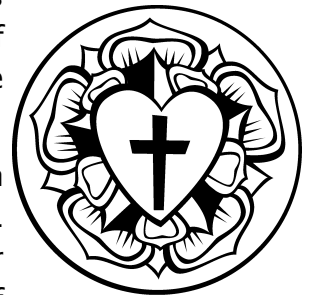

On October 31, 1517, Martin Luther, a German monk and University Professor issued a challenge to debate any fellow professor regarding 95 points of concern about the teachings of the church. As was the custom, this challenge was posted on the door of the University Church. This challenge was discovered by someone who was at the cutting edge of technology, a printer, and these 95 Theses for debate were circulated to the general public.

Thus began the Reformation. This month is the 500th anniversary of the beginning of the Lutheran Reformation. Many events will be observed around our country, in our synod and in our church. This ought to be a great time of celebrating our roots, reflecting on where we have been, and pondering the future of God's work among us.



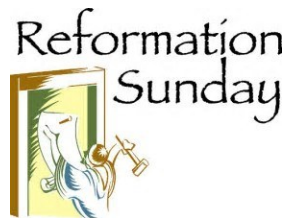
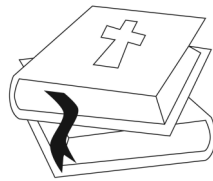

## BIBLE PRESENTATION, OCTOBER 22

## COUNCIL NOMINATIONS

So, you're wondering what it means to be a member of the Congregational Council. Well, yes, the Council is the governing body of the church. They are responsible for the general oversight of the life and activities of the congregation.

Yes, that's a pretty broad statement. But what are the responsibilities of a Council Member? The main responsibility is to involve all members of this congregation in worship, learning, witness, service and support and to promote a congregational climate of peace and goodwill.

Other responsibilities include:

- attending monthly Council meetings held the first Tuesday of each month;
- to oversee and provide for the administration of this congregation to enable it to fulfill its functions and perform its mission;
- acting as liaison to at least one of the church's Activation Teams - attending those meetings and reporting activities to the Council;
- maintaining supportive relationships with the pastor and staff;
- to create mutual understanding if any differences and/or conflicts arise in the congregation;
- and be responsible, as a Council, for the financial and property matters of this congregation.

"Wow, that's a lot of responsibilities. I'm not sure I can commit to all of that....."  
I can agree, being a member of the Congregational Council is a big responsibility, but it's also a great way to learn the "behind the scenes" workings of the church.

Our Council is a hard working, supportive group. Monthly meetings are sometimes very serious but are often times interesting and fun. Meetings last about 1 - 1 ½ hours. A Council "retreat" is held on a Saturday in January. This time is used to get to know one another better, to discuss ways to be a better Council presence in the Congregation and for fellowship.

So, this Council member stuff sounds pretty interesting but you need to know more? Find out by talking with a present Council member - we are always open and available to the congregation.

And, last but not least..... nominations are currently being taken. Terms are for 3 years and begin in January. Ages high school to ??? are eligible to be elected. Members of the Nominations Activation Team are: Al Danilko, Bobbie Laciak Kim von Schlichten, Dan Lucas and Sue Boggs.

## LUTHERAN DISASTER RELIEF

The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) has a division in it that keeps its eyes open for disasters, near and far, and organizes help for them. Because this is within the ELCA's organization, nearly every penny of help that is given in donations reaches the afflicted area. Internationally, Lutheran World Relief has the reputation of being one of the best in using its resources and providing effective relief.

So, if you are watching the news and see that disaster has hit somewhere, and you would like to help, here's what you can do:

- Write out a check to First Lutheran Church (or you can give cash).
- Place it in one of the gold envelopes which you can find in the pew racks and note the disaster to which you are giving on the outside of the gold envelope
- Put the envelope in the offering basket or you can bring it to the church office

Your donation will swiftly be forwarded to the ELCA's disaster relief office, and your gift will be quickly put to good work.

## MATCHING GIFT PROGRAM 2017

First Lutheran has sponsored a Matching Gifts program since 2002. Members of First Lutheran are invited to make a gift to any non-profit, human service organization whose mission is in accordance with First Lutheran's mission, as agreed upon by our Social Ministry Activating Team. Such gifts will be matched by a First Lutheran Check and will be sent to the organization. Also, such gifts can be made throughout the year until the total budgeted amount of \$10,000 is met.

Individual organizations are only eligible to receive up to \$2,000 from the matching gifts program until November 12, 2017. If there are any matching funds money remaining after November 12, any size gift will be matched until the program budget is exhausted. The \$10,000 in matching funds is budgeted from our 2017 Trust Fund distribution.

## Reformation Reflections Continued

The **Mennonites & Amish** originally named after Menno Simons, from Reform roots, were the original Ana-Baptists who were against infant baptism—only baptizing believing adults.

The **Baptists** claim no single leader and no distinctive creed. The Mennonites were probably the closest ancestors of the Baptists. Adult believer's baptism by immersion is one of the ties between individual Baptist congregations. In 1641 Roger Williams established a congregation of Calvinistic Baptists in Rhode Island.

The **Episcopalian (Church of England)** Reformation was, at the beginning, mostly political—Henry the VIII wanted a divorce from his first wife and the Pope would not grant him one.

The **Methodists, Congregationalists and Independents** are an offshoot of the Church of England. From this group came the Pilgrim Fathers who brought their religion to America on the Mayflower.

The list goes on, the **Society of Friends (Quakers)**, the **Young Men's Christian Association (YMCA)** and the **Young Women's Christian Association (YWCA)**, the **Seventh Day Adventists**, the **Unitarian Church**, the **Mormons**, the **Salvation Army**, **Frontier Christianity** with its hellfire preaching and other groups not named here.

And the explosion continues—Television Evangelists and Mega Churches. So, let's rejoice at this 500<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Protestant Reformation, in the fact that we are not torturing or killing each other anymore—that finally stopped in the late 20<sup>th</sup> Century with the peace in Northern Ireland. Maybe someday Lutheran groups will also make their peace with each other.

In the ELCA today we are friends with the Presbyterians and the Episcopalians sharing Holy Communion ties with each other; and we are talking friendship with the Roman Catholic Church. Steps toward understanding each other and accepting that God loves us all.

## Reformation Reflections

In the year of our Lord 313 the Roman Emperor, Constantine the Great, established Christianity as the state religion of the entire empire. This was not an act of faith, but a political decision, an attempt to cement the far-flung reaches of the crumbling Roman Empire. In part, the Roman Empire became the Holy Roman Empire. Constantine paid travelling expenses to representatives from locations across the entire empire to attend the Council at Nicea. This Great Council formulated the Nicene Creed (page 104 in the Evangelical Lutheran Book of Worship).

Under the leadership from Rome the church developed into a huge power, a combination of religion and politics with the church holding the ace card, the keys to heaven. It was this power that Martin Luther faced when he nailed his 95 Theses to the castle church door in Wittenberg on October of 1517.

But Martin Luther was not the first. In the monasteries, abbeys and universities of the medieval world ideas about God and the meaning of life were stirring. The Renaissance was dawning and change was in the air. Church and state leaders protected their power and fought the changes with the stocks, whippings, torture and public executions.

In 1457 John Huss led a group of Christians he called “Unity of the Brethren.” The group called for the repudiation of war, political power, humans laws and the laws of the papacy. Terrible and cruel persecution followed and John Huss was tried and burned at the stake. We know this group today as the **Moravians**. They survived by fleeing to the hills and wilderness areas of Czechoslovakia. They were avid missionaries and the group spread to Germany, and eventually to North America.

The real explosion of ideas about God, who He is, who we are and how to worship Him, came after Luther posted the 95 Theses. Lutheranism spread to Denmark, Norway, Sweden and Finland and, of course to North America.

The **Reform Church** began in Switzerland. Ulrich Zwingli based in Zurich. John Calvin in Geneva and Desiderius Erasmus, born in Rotterdam (famous in Lutheranism for his debate with Martin Luther) started the Reform Church in Holland and eventually moved to Basel to be closer to the center of the movement. The Scottish Reformation was led by John Knox and the **Presbyterian Church** comes out of the Reform tradition of Ulrich Zwingli.
