

This Christmas is the 205th anniversary of the writing and first performance of "Silent Night". Joseph Mohr, pastor of the Church of St. Nicholas in Oberndorf, a village near Saltzburg, Austria, discovered that the church organ was not working. Perhaps it was due to rust, or perhaps mice had chewed the leather bellows. No one really knows. Pastor Mohr had written a poem a few years before. He asked organist, Franz Gruber, to write a melody that could be sung with guitar. In a few hours, Gruber wrote the melody. Gruber and Mohr sang "Silent Night" for the congregation that Christmas Eve. Twenty years later, the song was brought to the United States. It was sung in German at Trinity Church in New York City. It wasn't translated into English until 1863. Today "Silent Night" has been translated into over 300 languages and sung all over the world.
