The Union Mission is a faith-based organization providing resources that lead to safe, affordable, and sustained housing.

Lives are forever changed when neighbors, businesses, landlords, churches - the community at large - all rally to ensure that a person or family experiencing homelessness has the support, dignity, and compassion they need.

The Union Mission has been working to pull together community members and people experiencing homelessness or other housing insecurities in Westmoreland and surrounding counties for over 30 years. Starting by taking the first resident into Emergency Shelter in 1987, the Mission has evolved into providing a system of interventions to assist people transition to safe, affordable, and sustained housing.

**FOOD from the HEART:** Recently FFTH has found it difficult to keep our cupboards stocked with nonperishables. We are asking the congregation for small monthly donations in the early months of 2025 to assist us with this problem. There will be boxes available in the Fellowship Hall for donations in February, and March.

Here is our wish list:

March: broth, diced or crushed tomatoes or spaghetti sauce.

# **STEWARDSHIP MOMENT**

I work with the women of FFTH, we plan, prepare and serve up to 70 brownbag lunches every Wednesday to any one who would like one.

My journey with FFTH started years ago when my Mom and I wanted to be more involved in the life of First Lutheran. We had practiced our kitchen skills in our own kitchens for a lifetime and were confident that we could be helpful . We were, but meal prep for a large number of people is definitely different than getting dinner ready for your family. We learned so much along the way, shared life events as well as incidents at FFTH with the other women, laughed and fumed and made wonderful friendships. By now one would think that the program would run smoothly - **it does not**! Problem solving is constant, too much, too little, wrong ingredients, who can run out and get what is missing... on and on.

Giving back is a term that is probably overused, but no other phrase works when one is aware of the blessings in your life that may not be present in other's lives. Working in this capacity makes me feel that I am following Jesus' direction to love and serve my neighbors.

The congregation is so supportive of the program, I feel there is a pride in our efforts to help the community. The community in turn is aware of the giving nature of First's congregation and how God works through our church.

The clients seem to enjoy the meals and are grateful for the assistance, often voicing God's blessings to the workers, Pastor Chris and the church.
